ArrowCorps⁵ A Higher Adventure

Coming in the summer of 2008 will be the highlight of many Scouting careers. The Order of the Arrow, along with the U.S. Forest Service, will be undertaking the biggest service project ever in the history of the Boy Scouts of America. ArrowCorps⁵, also know as AC5, will be taking place at 5 different State Parks and Forests across the country, with 1,000 Arrowmen per site, and will be taking place over 5 different weeks. The sites that will be included for AC5 will be George Washington and Jefferson Forest in Virginia and the only site in the Great Southern Region, Mark Twain National Forest in Missouri, Manti-La Sal in Utah, Bridger-Tetons in Wyoming, and Shasta-Trinity in California. Each Lodge should have an AC5 Youth and Adult Coordinator to help arrange with registration and travel plans. These Coordinators should work closely with the Section AC5 Coordinator, Anthony Kenny. During the course of the week at each site, members will be conducting service projects to better the site. If all goes according to plan, the service that will be accomplished in the sites will save the U.S. Forest Service 30 years of work! This is truly an amazing feat and it can only be done with your help. Everyone will be able to take part in a day of recreation at each site that includes things specific to the region of the country you are in. Some of these activities will be whitewater rafting, horseback riding, and touring dinosaur fossil beds. This is going to be an amazing event and an amazing time and space is limited to 1,000 people per site. Act quickly because spots will not last long. 

Plan your project for another day before October 20th, and if eligible, submit your One Day Award application (along with your One Day report) to your Section One Day Coordinator by Monday, November 19th, 2007. Wondering about the benefits of the One Day of Service program? Well, in addition to performing cheerful service, One Day '07 will allow local chapters and Lodges the opportunity to give something back to their hometown. Benefiting hundreds of towns and communities across the nation, One Day '07 will also increase the level of service performed by the Order of the Arrow as a whole. Lodges may select any type of community service, working with groups like Habitat for Humanity, the Red Cross, and the Salvation Army. Again, your project can be as large or as small as your Lodge wants it to be, as long as it benefits the local, non-scouting community in some way. It is up to your Lodge to coordinate the logistics of your projects and turn in a record of your project to your OA section.
